LOOKING TOWARDS CHRISTMAS

Judging by decorations and store displays, Christmas is upon us! We'll be enjoying the Christmas feeling this month at Reservoir Church, while also paying attention to the season of Advent and the way it calls us towards waiting and anticipation. Read on for more, plus kids and youth updates and our families calendar.

PRESCHOOL AND KINDERGARTEN

We've concluded our journey through the core Old Testament stories. In December, in the language of Godly Play, we enter the time of the color purple, the time for getting ready to come close to the Mystery of Christmas. During Advent, the season we at Reservoir call Light in the Darkness, we share the story of Jesus' birth that builds progressively from week to week. We begin with the prophets who point the way to Bethlehem. Then come Mary and Joseph with their donkey. Then come the shepherds who hear the angel's message and hurry to see the Child who will change everything. Then the Magi arrive with their strange gifts. The final surprise is for the cow who finds a baby in its feed box. Grownups and children together will get to experience a version of this Godly Play story together in Big Church on December 3 at both the 9:30 and 11:30 services. During Kids Church on December 17, we'll host a simple pageant or re-telling of the story. There are no rehearsals. Every child who comes to Kids Church that Sunday gets a costume and gets to participate.

YOUTH GROUP

The middle school youth group is finishing their fall project: the Old Testament stop motion animation films. The young people created the storyboards, scenes, and animations, and planned the movie premier scheduled for December 3 at 11 AM in the MPR. The middle schoolers generated everything from the films to the invitations to the playlist to the snacks. It will be quite a festive event, so we hope to see you there!

The high school youth group has their own set of festivities. We have been meeting in intimate groups to share about our stories and how God plays a role. The high schoolers have experienced God through a variety of means, including hiking, Brazilian food, and intimate conversations over tea. As we transition into the Advent season, we will focus on the themes of light and darkness and the redemptive role Jesus plays, both in the Christmas story, as well as in our day-to-day lives.

ELEMENTARY

In November the Elementary group heard stories from the books of Samuel and Kings as we talked about the often-strained relationship between worldly kingship and God's plans for God's people. The unit's four stories were longer and more complicated than we usually attempt, but they had plenty of drama and intrigue—not to mention violence—to hold the kids' interest. We ended the month by talking about the idea of a new kind of messiah: one who would carry out God's plan through means other than force of arms and worldly power.

That leads right into our Advent lessons! During Advent lots of our attention will be on preparing for our Christmas performance, which we'll present between services on December 17. We started work at the end of November, and many of the kids are already very excited about it! With jobs available from lead actor to prop designer, there's space for everyone to get involved in a way that feels comfortable to them. While all that's going on, though, we'll still be hearing the stories leading up to Jesus' birth and talking about what the different parts of those stories might mean to different people who hear them.
